OUR HISTORY

Downtown Magnets High School began in 1981 as the Downtown Business Magnet (DBM), a component of the Los Angeles Unified School District's expanding voluntary integration program. When the Electronic Information Magnet (EIM) was created in 1994, DBM adopted the name "Downtown Magnets" to incorporate both magnets into its name. We now house the Academy of Fashion Design and Merchandising, The Academy of Engineering, The Academy of Information Technology, and the Academy of Finance. We have a thriving IB program where almost 100% of students consistently earn the full International Baccalaureate Diploma. After 41 years on Temple Street, DMHS moved in 2022 to the campus of Roybal Learning Center, but we maintain our separate identity and name on the far side of campus at First Street and Beaudry Avenue.

INFO ABOUT COVID-19

On March 13, 2020, all LAUSD schools were closed for the rest of the semester. Work was done remotely until the term ended. At that time, no student could be assigned a failing grade. Students could improve, but not drop below their mid-term mark (the last in person grading period).

In the fall of 2020, we returned to a regular A-F grading system, but we were remote learning only. In April 2021, students were invited to return to campus but remain in online learning. Because of this, only about 5% decided to return and remained remote for the entire year.

Because the vast majority of LAUSD students live in poverty that greatly affected their ability to learn, the district implemented a policy that allowed students to use a Pass/No Pass (P/NP) grade for some or all classes for the 2020-21 school year only. In the Fall of 2021 we returned to a fully in person experience, with those who wished to stay remote moving to the district virtual school. Some have returned for the 2022-23 school year.

MAGNET PROGRAMS

DBM

Downtown Business Magnet attracts students from throughout the district, and includes the Academy of Finance, and the Academy of Fashion Design and Merchandising. Students in the Finance program enroll in up to eight accelerated courses, one of which is a college course, Foundations of Corporate Finance, taken at the University of Southern California. Design and Merchandising seniors are placed as interns at various industry sites in the Downtown fashion district. Academy courses include Clothing, Apparel Skills, Design, and Merchandising. The culminating activity is a show featuring fashion lines designed and created by the senior students.

DBM is proud to maintain strong partnerships with the Fashion Institute of Design and Merchandising, Woodbury University, Cal Mart, and many other businesses.

EIM

The Electronic Information Magnet incorporates technology into all aspects of the educational process and was originally developed with the L.A. Central Library and the UCLA Graduate School of Education. EIM includes the Academy of Information Technology, which contains both computer science and digital design pathways, and the Academy of Engineering. A sampling of classes unique to EIM includes Engineering Design and Development, Computer Science, Generative Art, Digital Production, Media Arts, and Filmmaking.

IB

IB was introduced to our school 11 years ago with some preparatory courses. The curriculum was very rigorous, and these students sacrificed higher GPA's by remaining in the program. 2017 marked the first graduating cohort of our school's IB Diploma Programme. Of the 60 students over three cohorts who completed the curriculum, 57 received the full diploma, many with extra points. In 2022, the school saw 120 graduates in 6 cohorts, with 116 receiving the full diploma
